1.	Behaviour and Readiness for Learning	Children struggling to control behaviour are supported when necessary. This results in better academic achievement and children who are able to fulfil their potential.
2.	Below Expected Attainment for Maths & English	Return to normal levels of achievement, following disruption caused by Covid-19, particularly for our families who did not cope with the demands of home learning.
		There has also been a greater impact on our younger children, and we need to ensure that children who were toddlers during the pandemic and are now just starting school, have had any additional needs/gaps in their development identified.

3.	Participation in School Trips	Pupils feel included in activities they may otherwise not be financially able to take part in. Pupils experience new skills and activities.

4.	Provision of Curriculum Enhancing Opportunities such as Music, Sport & Art	Pupils feel passion for a new activity and feel included within school life through taking part. Pupils may find a skill they enjoy and want to progress further with, and experience a broader range of opportunities.
		Shows and productions give all children joy and sense of fun and laughter. Pupils learn through drama and music.
5.	Provision of Wrap Around Care	That all children feel equal with their peers and have the undivided attention of an adult for homework tasks.

Below Expected Attainment for Maths & English	Return to normal levels of achievement, following disruption caused by Covid-19, particularly for our families who did not cope with the demands of home learning. Larger number of pupils achieving at, or exceeding, the expected standard in end of year tests in Maths & English.	Our Year 2 SATS results were above 80% in all areas, and our Year 6 SATS results were an astonishing 91%. We have also raised the expectation for children able to achieve greater depth in their learning, and ensured that this is across the board for all our children.

Every child in receipt of Pupil Premium funding has had their school trips/activities fully funded or subsidised according to need. We are proud that all children have engaged in all trips with the exception of one KS2 trip. For this trip the parent was offered every incentive possible. The positive impact from this is enormous and benefits areas 1, 2, 4 & 6 too.
